Did you know?


There are seven million people in the United States suffering from diabetes who have not yet been diagnosed.

Climb4ACure is working to promote awareness and provide funding for preemptive measures that should be taken to check for diabetes symptoms at its earliest stages. Grants, such as one made January 2012, to North Mississippi Medical Center of Tupelo, Mississippi to support their efforts to diagnose and treat patients early on.

"Many diabetics go undiagnosed for long periods of time," said Tina Felks, Director of the North Mississippi Medical Center Diabetes Center. "We will be using the [grant] funds to provide diabetes selfmanagement education, testing supplies, and insulin to indigent patients. We will also provide community education sessions and free blood sugar checks. These community events give us the opportunity to identify these patients earlier, and help prevent complications such as renal failure, heart disease, and blindness".

Diabetes can lead to complications such as heart disease, higher risk for stroke, high blood pressure, blindness, kidney disease, nervous system disease, and amputation of limbs. Adults with diabetes have heart disease death rates and risk for stroke 2 to 4 times higher than adults without diabetes. Diabetes is the leading cause of kidney failure and new cases of blindness among adults aged 20-74 years. Each year, over half of all amputations in the United States are caused by diabetes and subsequent complications, with most being lowerextremity amputations. For many underprivileged families, the money needed to have a doctor assess or treat possible diabetes symptoms is simply beyond their means.

This is why it is crucial to raise awareness and funds for those suffering from diabetes. "Through proper education and access to care and supplies, diabetes can be managed effectively and complications prevented" said Kendra Thayer of Garrett County Memorial Hospital.




